Medical and Humanitarian Emergencies 7-11 December 2009

The course comprises a 5-day curriculum covering such topics as emergency planning, epidemiological assessment, control of communicable diseases, information and surveillance systems, environmental sanitation and meeting nutritional needs. Additional issues include the protection of women and vulnerable populations, the basics of humanitarian law, documentation and prevention of human rights abuses, psychosocial and mental health, and logistical support for refugees and displaced persons.

This course is designed for those with an interest in leadership and management responsibilities in humanitarian relief operations.

Design, Monitoring and Evaluation of Health Programs

4 – 9 January, 2010

This module concentrates on results-based management while focusing on alignment between health program impact, outcomes, quality and cost. Participants will learn to develop a health program matrix using the project life cycle approach APDIME (Assessment, Planning, Design, Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation).
